Welcome New Ross Recreation Manager



The Town welcomed Mike Armstrong at the July Council meeting. He began his new position as Recreation Manager on July 1st. Mike commented, "I am excited to be joining the Ross team and look forward to continuing to provide excellent recreation programming to the community."

Mike most recently was Director of Facilities with Schools of the Sacred Heart in San Francisco. He has nearly thirty years of experience in facilities management; sports, leisure and recreation services management including work at the University of San Francisco, Richmond Parks and Recreation Department and the City of Albany. He has earned a Master of Science in Recreation and Park Administration from California State University Sacramento, and Bachelors of Science in Natural Resources Conservation from U.C. Berkeley where he graduated with honors.

Council Considers Regulating Plastic Carryout Bags

The Council introduced an ordinance that would prohibit the use of plastic single-use carryout bags by specified retailers, and impose a mandatory charge for each recyclable paper carryout bag distributed by retailers.



In May, 2013, the Marin County

Grand Jury issued its report "Holding the Bag" which encouraged the Marin Hazardous & Solid Waste Joint Powers Authority (JPA) to prepare the Model Single-Use Bag Ordinance to implement the strictest rules possible and encourage all agencies to adopt the ordinance. The JPA, of which Ross is a member, has prepared the ordinance for consideration by each of the member agencies. The ban on single-use plastic bags would be imposed in all grocery stores, convenience stores, pharmacies and restaurants within the County. The intent of the ordinance is to reduce the environmental impacts related to plastic carryout bags, and to promote a shift toward the use of reusable carryout bags.

The Council also adopted a Resolution certifying the Final Environmental Impact Report (EIR) the JPA published in January 2014, that could be used by member agencies for ordinance adoption. Read the full staff report here. ■

Council Discusses New Town Signs



The Council approved the replacement of the existing Fire & Police sign in front of the public safety building. The sign has deteriorated over the years and the support posts have rotted necessitating it being replaced. The staff also recommended a new sign for Town Hall as there as been no clear signage in the past for people to easily locate the building. The recommended signs



match the design and materials used for the downtown and other directional signs installed last year. The Council weighed the options of aluminum vs. wood with aluminum costing about 50% less, and opted for wood signs.

signs to match the design standard for the downtown and other directional signs. The current signs are the standard green and white signs seen in most communities. The Council approved changing the design standard for street signs.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Bicycle Safety:

A new California traffic law (AB 1371) requires drivers passing a bicycle heading in the same direction, to go past it at a distance not less than three feet. However, if it is not possible, you must slow down to a reasonable



speed. You are only allowed to pass when there is no potential danger. This law will go into effect on September 16, 2014, so get into the habit now of giving bicyclists three feet of space.

California Vehicle Code (CVC) 22107 requires cyclists to yield and signal before moving left or right, and CVC 21212 requires cyclists under the age of 18 to wear helmets.



Ross Recognized by the EPA as Green Power Community

The Town of Ross was recognized as a Green Power Community by the Environmental Protection Agency again in 2014 for choosing to use Marin Clean Energy's (MCE) recommunity. My choice, newable power. This is the Town's second year receiving the honor. The EPA's Green Power Partnership is a voluntary program that encourages organizations to use green

power as a way to reduce the environmental impacts associated with conventional electricity use. The Town of Ross was instrumental in founding MCE, a public, not-for-profit electricity provider that saves customers money. MCE customers are expected to save \$5.9 million in 2014. Customers also benefit from the increased stability of rate changes only once per year. Most of the power MCE supplies comes from CLEAN, RENEWABLE SOURCES such as solar, wind, bioenergy, geothermal, and hydro. MCE also supports local Green jobs and new local renewable energy generation with projects such as: 972 kWh of solar at the San Rafael Airport, I MW of solar at a Carport Shade in Novato, and 500 kW of solar at the Novato Cooley Quarry.
