

Home Security Checklist

Dear Resident:

Burglary and most other crimes are crimes of opportunity. If you, as a homeowner, can reduce the opportunity for a criminal to commit a crime at your residence, you will be reducing your chances of becoming a victim. The attached checklist was designed to help identify security weaknesses at your home.

Please utilize this checklist to identify areas where your residential security can be enhanced. Every "NO" checkmark identifies what may be a vulnerable area and should be corrected to improve your home's security. If you require assistance, the Ross Police Department will have a representative come to your residence to conduct a "Security Survey" which would take less than one hour. A police officer will inspect your home and discuss all aspects of home security and personal safety with you.

I would like to encourage all residents to participate in keeping our community safe by securing their homes and activating their alarm systems when they leave their residences. Going on vacation? 1.	Are your exterior doors of solid construction?		
2.	Do your entry doors have wide-angle viewers?		
3.	Do exterior doors have cylinder type deadbolt locks with at least a		
	one inch throw and beveled cylinder guards?		
4.	Do the doors without cylinder locks have a heavy bolt or some		
	similar secure device that can only be operated from the inside?		
5.	Can ALL your doors (basement, porch, French, balcony) be securely locked?		
6.	Are your locks in good repair?		
7.	Are the door strike plates and hinges installed with three-inch screws?		
8.	Do you know <u>everyone</u> who has a key to your house?		
9.	Do all your out swinging doors have the hinges pinned or have non-		
	removable pins?		
10.	Do your exterior lights have a minimum of 60 watt bulbs?		
11.	Are entry areas unobstructed by shrubbery, and other décor to permit		
	maximum visibility?		
12.	Do sliding doors have an auxiliary lock that locks both door panels		
	together or to the frame?		
13.	Is the garage door secured with a padlock, hasp, or other auxiliary looking device?		
14.	Do you lock your garage when not in use?		
15.	When you park your car, do you remove the keys out, even when you park inside your garage?

1.	Do you arrange for neighbors or friends to pick up your newspapers, and other delivered packages?		
2.	Do you notify your neighbor(s) that you will be gone?		
3.	Do you arrange to keep your lawn maintained?		
4.	Do you use timing devices for your lights and radios?		
5.	Without creating too much visibility, do you leave some shades up or		
	curtains open to give the appearance of being occupied?		
6.	Do you lock all doors and windows when leaving?		
7.	Do you notify the Ross Police Department of the dates that you will		
	be gone, and provide an emergency number where you can be reached?
