Mayor's Corner

August is usually a slow month in Ross, with many families grabbing a last few days of vacation before school starts again (August 22) and indeed the streets don't seem very busy. But actually, there's

quite a bit going on. A sewer district contractor is finishing up replacement of large sewer pipes on Lagunitas Road near Ross school. Similar replacements on Shady Lane and Bolinas Avenue have been postponed for ten to twelve weeks awaiting arrival of more pipe.

Sealing of various streets has been completed and repaving of Wellington Avenue and Fallen Leaf as well as rebuilding of sidewalks along Wellington Avenue are underway.

Construction in Ross - When Will it End?

Once again it is a busy summer and fall construction season as old, deteriorated infrastructure is being replaced and repaired with new infrastructure. Here is an update from our Public Works Director that may help shed some light on projects going on in Town.

The Town's annual roadway rehabilitation project began last week in Winship Park with the removal of damaged curb, gutter and sidewalk along Wellington Avenue. The installation of new sidewalk, curb and gutter should be completed by early next week, and construction of new asphalt paving on Wellington Avenue between Garden Road and the "Y"



at the Baywood Avenue intersection, and all of Fallen Leaf will begin soon after. One lane of traffic on Wellington and Fallen Leaf will be maintained continuously wherever possible. Please expect traffic delays in this area over the next I-2 weeks.

Ross Valley Sanitation District (RVSD) is in the process of rehabilitating several existing large diameter sewer pipelines using both open trench and trenchless techniques (which still requires open bore pit excavation). RVSD is scheduled to complete much of their rehabilitation work in Ross this coming winter. Similar to last year, the improvements are needed to rehabilitate and repair the sanitary sewer collection system to reduce the potential for spills and to reduce the amount of groundwater entering the collection system. RVSD recently completed pavement restoration and slurry seals on several roads in Ross, and construction work on Lagunitas Road will be completed before school starts August 22, but Bolinas Avenue at Shady Lane and Ross Common Park are scheduled to start up later this Fall. Ross Common roadway (open trench and bore pits), Kent & Poplar Avenue (mostly open trench) are scheduled for next year.

The Poplar and Ross Commons work will have major impacts on the downtown commercial and residential district next year. The scope of work involves an extensive open trench project spanning 6-8 weeks of restrictive traffic control from Kent Avenue all the way to the Post Of-

Samples of new LED streetlights proposed by PG&E to replace the outdated mixture of incandescent and high pressure sodium lights currently providing us illumination throughout the Town have been installed on Ross Common and in the Winship area. Please let us know if you have comments on their effectiveness.

Throughout Town, PG&E's contractor is busy trimming trees away from power lines. Because of concerns raised by recent wildfires, more extensive cutting is being done to establish greater clearances based on new clearance standards from the California Public Utilities Commission

(CPUC).

The Ross Recreation staff is busy preparing for a movie night on Ross Common on Friday, August 17th and for the Town dinner at the same location on September 28th. Save the dates.

The Town Council will be taking action at our monthly meeting on amendments to our social host regulations, our bicycle and pedestrian plan, and our wireless telecommunications facilities regulations.

fice, followed by 2-3 weeks of trenchless work. A public workshop will be scheduled to address public concerns and questions for this very large RVSD project.



This year also saw PG&E completing two large gas main projects on Lagunitas and Upper Roads. Their next gas main trench work on Baywood is scheduled for later this year and could result in one-way traffic con-

trol on Baywood and Wellington for 3-4 weeks.

Marin Municipal Water District (MMWD) will be starting a Fire Flow Improvement project that will replace existing water lines with larger size pipelines to improve water flow with open trench work on Southwood Ave, scheduled to begin in mid-September and completed by early October. The remaining work on Crest Road, Baywood Ave, Canyon Rd, Monte Alegre Rd, Pomeroy Rd, and Newell Rd. will likely be spread over the next few years.

Attendees will learn how to make a home and landscaping more fire resistant, critical safety steps to take in case of an evacuation, and other important information you should know to be ready. Informative handouts will be provided, local fire department representatives will be in attendance, and there is ample opportunity for Q&A.

Back to School Safety

~ Message from the Chief

Believe it or not, kids will be headed back to school soon. Now is a good time to remind children and parents how to safely return to school. Whether your children are walking, being driven, or riding a bicycle, here are a few tips to ensure their safety.

If kids are walking:



- Map out a safe route to school and walk it with your child so he/she becomes familiar with the route.
- Make sure your child crosses at intersections where there is a crossing

guard. Have children wear bright clothing that can be seen by drivers.

Riding or driving in the car:

 Everyone must wear a seat belt. Use age-appropriate child care/booster seat. If you have a teen driving, remind him/her of safe driving, use of seat belts at all times, and no cell phone use while driving.

On a bicycle:

- Make sure your child always wears a helmet.
- Teach children to ride in the same direction as traffic, on the right side of the road. Explain the "rules of the road" and to obey all traffic signs and signals.

Tips for driving in a school zone:

Slow down - The simplest thing any driver can do when there are new driving hazards is slow down.

Allow More Time - As a new school year begins allow yourself more time to get where you are going until you can figure out the effects of increased traffic.

Learn the Rules - Schools usually have places for parents to drop off and pick up children. If you are driving your child to school learn where these areas are and follow the procedures. Never block pick up and drop off areas.

Yield to Pedestrians - Remember to yield to children/parents in crosswalks as they have the right-of-way.

Carpool - If at all possible carpool with other parents to pick up and drop off children.

Talk with Teen Drivers. Remind your teen drivers about the importance of being extra careful in and around school zones.
