
There has been a lot of interest recently in the Branson School, which has announced that it wants to significantly enrollment increase from 320 students to 400-440 students. Here Elizabeth Robbins, MD is some background information about the

school: In the 1970s the high school included a day school for boys and a boarding school for girls. In 1978 voters in Ross approved an ordinance allowing for a Use Permit for a day school with enrollment capped at 320 students. The Town adopted a number of conditions at the time to ensure that the impact of the school, located in a residential neighborhood, did not increase as the use changed from a boarding school to a day school. Among the conditions specified in the 1978 Use Permit were (1) limiting the

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WUI Map for Ross Introduced

Assuring the health and safety of the community is one of the overarching goals of the General Plan. In an attempt to further the Town's General Plan goals and policies to minimize the risks of fire danger, the Town Council conducted the first of two public hearings to adopt a Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI) map for the Town of Ross, and to amend several



chapters in the Municipal Code to facilitate reducing the risk of wildfires. You may be asking yourself what is a WUI? A WUI is defined as any area where man-made improvements are built close to, or within, natural terrain and flammable vegetation, and where high potential for wildland fire exists. Wildfires are a natural part of Marin County's varied ecosystems and history. Reducing risks within a WUI and planning ahead to take actions to reduce fire hazards can increase your safety and help protect your property. To address such risks, the Town of Ross and the Ross Valley Fire Department have prepared a WUI map and regulations to facilitate the reduction of fire risks. The WUI map is comprised of those parcels that are classified Hillside Lots (Slope Hazard Stability Zone classifications 3 and 4 and 30% or greater slopes), and par-

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the number of students to 320, the enrollment in 1978; (2) limiting the use of the athletic facilities to the number of events in 1978; (3) limiting the use of the auditorium to school events, and prohibiting special events to which the public unassociated with the school was invited; (4) limiting the number of parking places on campus, and (5) limiting buildings on campus to those shown in the 1978 master plan for the school. These conditions were intended to allow Branson to continue as one of the top schools in the area without increasing its impact on the town, particularly in terms of traffic and parking. Over the years the Town Council has voted to allow several amendments to the Use Permit, including allowing the construction of additional buildings such as the student center, the gym, and classrooms; increasing parking; allowing the auditorium to be used for various Ross School events; and approving an artificial turf field.

Branson has said that increasing student enrollment will allow for more diversity, more sports programs, and more classes. Some residents have raised concerns about the significant increase in traffic throughout Ross as well as in the adjacent neighborhoods. Residents have also raised concerns about parking; cars and buses sometimes line both sides of the streets near the school. Branson has said they will be looking into improving traffic calming measures and parking. During the day, some parking is available at St. Anselm's church; vans shuttle students to the campus. A proposed traffic calming measure is to install signs with flashing lights to alert drivers when they are speeding.

More information about the process Branson would follow to obtain any increase in its enrollment will be forthcoming.

RVPA Parcel Tax November 2018 Election



The Council adopted a resolution calling for an election on November 6, 2018 to place a measure on the

ballot for the renewal of the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority (RVPA) Special Tax for Paramedic Services. The RVPA is an 8member joint powers authority (IPA) established in



1982 for the purpose of delivering Fire Department paramedic services and ambulance transport services in the Ross Valley. The primary funding mechanism for the RVPA is the special tax which if approved would increase from \$75 per living unit to \$79.50 in fiscal year 2019-20 and increase each year to \$91.50 by 2022-23. Each taxable residential unit is taxed along with every 1,500 square feet of non-residential structure. This taxation funding source has been in place since the inception of the RVPA in 1982. Every four years, the citizens who reside within the member communities of the RVPA service area vote to fund the tax for a four-year period. The current tax expires June 30, 2019.

cels that are geographically adjacent to Hillside lots where incorporation into the map makes geographical sense. The proposed regulations would also address defensible space vegetation removal consistent with state law, and vegetation management and fire safe landscaping materials for all properties designated as being within a WUI based on the adopted map. The amendments to the Municipal Code would also require the use of noncombustible and fire resistive materials and treatments for all properties in Town to better protect structures and inhibit fire spread both at the planning and building permit level. The effect of the amendments would be similar to designating the entire Town as WUI for construction purposes but would not require Vegetation Management Plans or impose defensible space requirements for projects not located within a WUI designated area as shown on the WUI map. FY 19 Budget Adopted

The Town Council passed the Fiscal Year 2018-19 (FYE19) General Fund and Special Revenue Funds budget last night. The budget is the Town's financial plan for the upcoming year and includes revenues and expenses related to Town operations and capital improvements. The budget was developed based on the continuing objectives of providing high quality services to the community in an efficient, effective, responsive, and financially responsible manner. The overall budget for all Town Funds is \$10.1 million for FYE19. The budget is prudent and provides for a small General Fund surplus (revenues in excess of expenses). Additionally, we are aggressively paying down our CalPERS debt to minimize future CalPERS retirement obligation costs.



The Town utilizes a five year financial forecast and five year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) to better understand and plan for the future and provide services at a sustainable level while strategically maintaining and improving the infrastructure and facilities which serve Ross residents. The budget

includes over \$2.3 million for improving Town infrastructure and facilities such as final design and rehabilitation of Natalie Coffin Greene Park and Three Bear Hut; roadway rehabilitation of Wellington, Fallen Leaf, Olive, and Walnut Avenues; Bolinas Avenue drainage and roadway improvements; drainage improvements in other parts of Town to reduce localized nuisance flooding; and Winship Bridge replacement design. The budget includes providing the current services to Town residents as well as new projects and programs such as: new Planning and Building permit tracking software; develop detailed design guidelines; downtown revitalization and zoning review; continue with Zoning Ordinance cleanup and amendments; new recreational programs to meet community needs; and analysis of facilities at the Civic Center site.
