Winship Bridge Project - Next Step

Town Council approved a Resolution adopting the Final Initial Study/ Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS/MND) and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) for the Winship Bridge project. The approval of the IS/MND and MMRP will allow the Project to proceed to the 80% design level, with construction planned to begin in 2021. The new replacement bridge is being designed to ensure consistency with

current roadway and sidewalk design standards and improve water conveyance capacity within San Anselmo Creek by eliminating the arches and center bridge pier in the waterway widening the opening by approximately 6 feet and raising the elevation of the bridge deck approximately 4 feet. A single span, cast-in-place



or precast concrete slab type bridge is proposed, which would also provide for a travel way width of 20 feet and a 4.5-foot walkway on the north side. Other project features would include new curb, gutter, sidewalk, and accessible ramps between Sir Francis Drake Boulevard and Winship Avenue intersections inclusive. As part of the project, the Ross Valley Sanitary District will relocate and update the existing 6-inch gravity sewer line that is currently within the existing bridge deck through trenchless construction methods.

The IS/MND identifies several impacts to the surrounding neighborhood that will require mitigation measures, as described in the MMRP, to be implemented and enforced by Town staff throughout the construction process. Construction related noise and vibration impacts as well as pedestrian and vehicular traffic disruptions that will impact local residents are included. Although the proposed replacement bridge design will improve the flow capacity of the creek in the immediate and upstream reaches of San Anselmo Creek, several property owners who live downstream of the bridge expressed concern about the potential for increased water surface elevations on their properties if the San Anselmo Flood Risk Reduction (SAFRR) project is completed upstream. The mitigation measures to protect the homeowners from these impacts are described in the Environmental Impact Report for the SAFRR project that was certified and adopted by the Marin County Flood Control District in 2018.

Council Member Rupert Russell Commended

The Town Council commended and thanked outgoing Council Member Rupert Russell who was presented with commemorative gifts for serving a second term of office on the Council. Russell served previously on Council from 2010-2014. He was appointed in June 2016 to fill the two-year remaining term of outgoing Council Member Carla Small, and

was then re-elected in 2018 to fill the two-year remaining term of Council Member Katie Hoertkorn. His willingness to return to Council to fill the remaining terms of outgoing Council members is greatly appreciated!

Council member Russell has been a staunch advocate for consistent application of Town rules and regulations to all concerned and believes this is an essential element to all being treated fairly and equitably. He has also been a strong supporter of flood control having experienced flooding of his home in 2005.

Council Member Russell's term will officially end once the March 3rd election results are certified by the County Registrar and incoming Council-elect members are sworn into office.

Preliminary Election Results of March 3, 2020 Election



The ballots for the March 3, 2020 Town of Ross election are still being counted as we go to press. The preliminary election results indicate the following potential winners based on the votes counted thus far. For Council seats, five candidates ran for Council to fill three seats. The three names listed are in order of highest votes received.

Resident Still Needed for Mosquito & Vector Control Board

Is there an interested Ross resident available to fill a board vacancy on the Marin/Sonoma Mosquito & Vector Control District Board of Trustees? The Board consists of representatives from all jurisdictions in Marin and Sonoma County, but currently, Ross is not represented on this Board.

To serve on this committee, you must be a registered voter and reside in Ross. The new appointee's term would be through December 2022. The Board meetings are held monthly on the second Wednesday of each month at District Headquarters in Cotati. Each member is compensated \$100 per Board meeting for travel expenses (not to exceed \$100 per month).

Coronavirus Update

The Town of Ross is continuing to monitor and coordinate with the Marin County Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) regarding COVID-19 (novel coronavirus). The HHS has been issuing news releases to keep the public informed as the news regarding this pandemic is changing daily. The best way to reduce the risk of becoming infected is to practice good hygiene:

- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially before eating, after blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing; use an alcohol -based hand sanitizer when soap & water is not available;
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue or upper sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze;

- Stay home from work or school if you have a fever or are feeling sick;
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick;
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces with household sprays and wipes.

Five-Year Financial Forecast

The Town staff presented a five-year financial forecast to the Town Council on March 12. A financial forecast assists the Council and Town management in understanding the Town's ability to fund the current level of services being provided and determine if it is likely to be sustainable in the future. The good news is the forecast shows the current level of services is fundable over the next five years with some ability to also provide additional funding to capital projects in that time. The Ross voters passage of the public safety parcel tax measure (Measure K) in November 2016 and the Town's numerous steps to reduce future expenses such as pension and retiree health care costs have enhanced the Town's financial sustainability for the future

cession occurs. Financial planning is critical in our efforts to deliver effective and efficient services to the Town residents in a financially responsible manner.

If everybody lived like we do, with our affluent Bay Area lifestyles, FIVE EARTHS would be required! 65% of local carbon pollution comes from our household decisions and consumption. Resilient Neighborhood Climate Action Teams undertake carbonreducing actions that make a difference by empowering citizens to do something about climate change, lower their bills, and strengthen their communities. To date this group has already reduced 8,181,515 pounds of annual CO2 emissions - like taking 1,121 Marin households off the grid permanently! The program shows how to build resilience by: I) Decreasing dependence on fossil fuels; 2) Conserving resources; 3) Fortifying the local economy; and 4) Supporting local agriculture. We are working to form a Climate Action Team in Ross, and will invite you to participate in a free workshop series. Stay tuned for more information coming early this fall.
