Into each life some rain must fall, and in Ross that means II inches in 18 hours. To keep residents safe during the u n p r e c e d e n t e d "atmospheric river," Town staff worked tirelessly both before and during the October 25th storm. Days be-

fore the storm Town Clerk Linda Lopez sent town-wide emails notifying residents of the upcoming storm and Public Works staff Anthony Alcozer and Zach Baker cleared storm drains and culverts throughout Ross. Just after midnight on the eve of the storm, Police Chief Pata began monitoring the creek level every two hours. On Sunday morning he came to Town Hall, where he remained until Sunday night. Throughout the day, Chief Pata was in contact by phone with Town

The public safety facilities in Ross are nearing 100 years old and are physically and functionally obsolete with significant structural deficiencies. At the March 2021 Town Council meeting after much community input and discussion, the Town Council provided direction to staff to proceed with the next steps for replacing Town facilities to

include the police station, paramedic quarters, and administrative staff but to not replace the fire station at the same site. Since that time, Town staff and Councilmembers Brekhus and Kuhl, who are Directors of the Ross Valley Fire Department (RVFD) Board, have been working with the RVFD Management Team and Board of Directors on the best options to providing fire services in Ross and the other RVFD JPA communities (San Anselmo, Fairfax, and Sleepy Hollow) with the goal of providing a high level of service to the entire RVFD community including Ross.

At the November Council meeting, RVFD Fire Chief Jason Weber presented and updated the Town Council and community on the options related to not rebuilding the Ross fire station. Over the past months, the RVFD Board has been meeting to discuss the options. The eight service options identified were reduced to two viable service options to serve Ross and the other JPA entities. Both options would provide the same number of RVFD fire personnel as exists today. The two options are moving the engine currently located in Ross to the downtown San Anselmo station (thus two engines would operate there with two people on each engine at any time) or moving the fire staff currently in Ross to both the downtown San Anselmo engine and Fairfax engine thus increasing staffing on each engine from two people to three people. The operational, service, and financial considerations were discussed for both options. Each option has different advantages compared to the other alternative. After the in-depth presentation, the Council discussed the options and provided direction to RVFD Board Members Brekhus and Kuhl and the Town Manager for upcoming RVFD Board meetings. The RVFD Board of Directors will meet on November 10 on this topic. Ultimately, all four jurisdictions - Fairfax, Ross, San Anselmo, and Sleepy Hollow - will have to be in agreement for any option to be selected and implemented.

Manager Chinn, and by video conference with Fire Chief Jason Weber and the County Office of Emergency Services. Throughout the day, Town Manager Chinn and Chief Pata were communicating relating to the storm. Chief Pata and Linda Lopez sent town-wide emails during the storm,

warning residents of the possibility of flooding. Ms. Lopez was at home without power, but managed to dictate a flood warning email to Town employee Donna Redstone, who still had power and was able to send out the email. Police Sergeant John Adams used the Police Department's Facebook and Instagram accounts to update residents. Public Works employees Anthony and Zach were in Ross hroughout the storm clearing storm drains, helping with downed trees, responding to resident calls, and connecting a generator to the SFD traffic signals at Lagunitas and Laurel Grove. At noon, when flooding seemed likely, Chief Pata called in additional Ross police officers. By this time there was localized flooding and more trees had fallen. Soon thereafter a large oak tree fell across Lagunitas Road, cutting power to much of the town, including Town Hall; generator backup kept Town services functioning. Police closed Lagunitas Road because of live downed power lines. Shortly before 4pm, to warn residents about a possible flood, Alert Marin, an emergency notification system, was acti-

vated. In addition, the Town's emergency siren was activated, but, despite both generator and battery backup systems, the siren didn't go off. (Town staff fixed the malfunction and is regularly testing the system and its backup.) Chief Pata, former Chief Masterson and Officer Moy went door-to-door to advise residents along the creek to move to higher ground; most residents had already left their homes. Fortunately the creek didn't flood. Police and Public Works employees stayed in Ross through the evening, not leaving until the risk of flooding had passed.

Restrictive Covenants - Fair Housing in Marin

Last night, Marin County representatives gave a presentation on the Restrictive Covenant Project. A covenant is a legally enforceable contract imposed in a deed upon the buyer of property. Racially restrictive covenants refer to legal agreements that prohibit the purchase, lease, or occupation of a piece of property by a particular group of people and that prohibit the homeowner from selling or renting to anybody of a specific race or ethnic background. In a landmark 1948 ruling, the Supreme Court deemed all racial restrictive covenants unenforceable. Although the 1968 Fair Housing Act prohibited discrimination based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability, marital status, and familial status, many restrictive covenants continue to remain in property deeds throughout Marin.

Through the collaboration of the <u>Community Develop-</u> <u>ment Agency</u>, the <u>County's Office of Equity</u> and the <u>Assessor-Recorder's Office</u>, residents of Marin are able to certify and affirm that illegal and racially restrictive covenants are unconstitutional and violate current laws and County values. 

Laurel Grove Safe Pathways Project Alignment



tion of the alternatives by the Town Engineer and project consultants.

The project will provide a single 4' minimum width pedestrian pathway and protective asphalt berm adjacent to the existing travelled way of Laurel



Grove between Canyon Way and Sir Francis Drake Blvd. It is anticipated that the existing roadway will require widening and retaining walls in some locations and possible realignment of the existing lane striping to maximize the width available for the pathway. The Laurel Grove roadway between Sir Francis Drake Boulevard and Canyon Road will also be repaved and restriped with appropriate signage and other markers installed as required. Project details such as retaining wall façade, bicycle lane striping, additional onstreet parking opportunities, crosswalk locations, and traffic calming devices will be developed and discussed after the alignment is selected but prior to Town Council acceptance of the final design and authorization to bid the project for construction.

The following three design alternatives were presented, in consideration of pedestrian safety, alterations to private property frontages, available right of way, conflicts with existing utilities, parking, environmentally sensitive areas, and overall costs:

Alternative I: New pathway on the north side of Laurel Grove Avenue with driveway impacts;

Alternative 2: New pathway on the south side of Laurel Grove Avenue with Right of Way impacts;

Alternative 3: New pathway on the south side of Laurel Grove Avenue with Environmental impacts.

After discussing the alternatives and hearing public input on the project, the Town Council directed the Town Engineer to further analyze the design of Alternative 2.

Construction of a new pathway is expected to begin in the Summer of 2022.
