Dedication of Bald Hill

Bald Hill, the iconic 1132-foot mountain visible throughout the Ross Valley, has been acquired as permanent open space! Preserving the property, which had been privately owned by a single family for over 50 years, has long been a goal of conservationists.

A ceremony to unveil a plaque acknowledging the individuals and institutions that helped make the Bald Hill acquisition possible was held on Saturday, June 10th.

Unveiling the plaque, which is located at the base of Bald Hill in Natalie Coffin Greene Park, are Council Member Elizabeth Robbins, Dan Kalafatas, and San Anselmo Open Space Committee Chair Jonathan Braun (holding a sign from an

unsuccessful 1990 bond measure), who have worked for the past three years to acquire Bald Hill.

Fire-Smart Tips from the UC Master Gardeners

June: Clean up Zone Zero – 0-5' From Your Home Is Most Critical

 Woody plants, yard debris and mulch near structures can easily ignite from flying embers. Remove these items from the first five feet of structures.

Clean-up areas where wind eddies deposit

leaf and plant litter along the perimeter of your home, on the



roof, and under decks.

- Remove dead, damaged and diseased plant branches, trees and shrubs. Dispose of the material in your green waste bin.
- Move common combustible fire hazards as far away from your house as possible – or indoors immediately if a nearby fire threatens. These combustible items might include things such as brooms, rakes, plastic waste bins, wood piles and natural fiber door mats.
