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# Ross School and Police Work with Students for Common Good

Earlier this school year, messaging was sent home to families of Ross School students about riding scooters on the Common and taking precautions to avoid scaring or accidently striking pedestrians. To reinforce this messaging, Chief Pata met with Superintendent Rice, Principal Lubamersky, and other Ross School staff members to propose a student-managed communications project. In collaboration with school staff and the Ross Police Department, students will develop a video and classroom media campaign about escooter and e-bike safety on Ross Common. The video will be shown to students at The Ross School this year and again at the beginning of next year.

This month, students will be invited to the Ross Police station and work with Sergeant Danny Moy and the Chief to record public safety videos encouraging their classmates to be safe when riding to and from school and around the Common. Also, Ross police officers will recognize students who are doing a great job of safely navigating their e-scooters and e-bikes and giving advice to those students who are not following safe riding laws.

Our initiative will be re-enforced by the Safe Routes to School "Walk and Roll" events that will take place from March through May. The names of consistently safe riders will be sent to our Ross School team, so safe riders can be recognized and entered into the school's "Caught in the Act" drawing and mentioned in the school bulletin. Additionally, the Ross Police Association gives an award each year at the Ross School graduation. This year we will include for consideration someone who has worked hard on our mission of bicycle, e-bike and e-scooter safety both on their way to school and on the Common.

Council Member McMillan, Police Chief Pata, Public Works Director Simonitch, and other community members are part of the Safe Routes to School Task Force for the Town of Ross. Though the Task Force is separate from the student-led communications project at Ross School, the Task Force provides guidance and information.

### **New Amenities on Ross Common**

The Town continues its program to revitalize the Ross Common landscape features and add new amenities in preparation for another fun-filled year of sports and leisure activities for the young and the young at heart. A new 3-way drinking fountain and bottle filling station nearly completed along the new pathway, and a newly refurbished backstop are ready just in time for Ross Little League to start. Over the next few weeks the Town will begin replacing the two older benches within the grove area with three new low-maintenance, age-friendly benches along the pathway. Other projects planned

for this summer include removing and replacing the old boxwood hedges along the perimeter of the field with a new low hedge, and a new mini-plaza entry feature to the field located in line with the crosswalk from the Post Office. Stay tuned for updates over the next few months!

# Fire-Smart Tips from the UC Master Gardeners

**MARCH: Remove and replace invasive plants** 

- Remove invasive plants such as ivy, broom, and pampas grass that spread quickly, cause harm to the environment, add considerable fuel for fire and use precious water.
- Unfortunately, excessive clearing can create a vulnerable entry point for the plants we do not want.
- Pull weeds and invasive plants before they go to seed to keep them from spreading.
- Replace with California natives, pollinator or low water use plants keeping drought tolerance and biodiversity in mind.

For persistent invasives, consider sheet mulching to help with weed suppression. Additional information on appropriate mulches and use can be found following the link below.

# AGE FRIENDLY CORNER Tips to live long and well in Ross

5 Super-Basic Life Skills Not Learned Until 50 Years Old—That You Might Not Know Either

\*How to breathe: Deeper. Bring air down into the belly, through the nose. "Belly breathing" brings in more oxygen, and it's better for your lungs and can lower tension.

\*How to sit: First planting your feet, then using your thighs, butt and abdomen—not your arms—to power up and back down. This improves stability and strength.

\*How to stand: Position your feet right below your hips. 60 percent of your weight in the heels and 40 percent in the toe box area (from the ball of your big toe across to the ball of your small toe). Together, this area and the heels form a tripod to hold you up. From this solid foundation, with your knees rotated out ever so slightly, the rest of your body can naturally and properly stack above shoulders above pelvis.

\*How to walk: Keep your shoulders down and back (meaning not up by your ears!) and strike your steps from heel to toe. Then, for better balance, which produces more energy, swing your arms straight out, coordinating the movement so that the right arm is in front when the left leg is in front, and vice versa.

\*How to smile: Turn up the corners of your mouth, the very act of moving your mouth muscles into an upward curve tricks your brain into "reading" you as happy, igniting chemical changes that then make you feel so.
