I hope everyone can attend the Town Dinner on Friday September 22nd! If it appeals to you, you might consider sitting at the Community Tables where the Council will be sitting. The Community Tables will be for residents who wish to dine with other residents. Feel free to bring a dish to share if you like but no pressure. I am sure the

Town Dinner will be a great success and in advance, a big thank you to Ross Recreation and Ross Town staff for all their work.

The Ross Historical Society asked me to speak at a luncheon on 9/7/23. On the historical side, I tapped former councilmembers and mayors, Peter Brekhus, Gary Scales and Charlie Goodman.

The most obvious change in town operations is the professionalism of town management. We presently have 11 town employees, additional part-time Rec staff, 8 employees with the police, with fire staffed by a separate department.

Past councilmembers actually ran the town and performed the town services. There was a part-time building inspector up until the 90's, no planning staff until the 90's and certainly no town manager. In one flood emergency, two councilmembers rescued residents on Shady Lane in a canoe, and councilmembers personally raised money to light all the bridges and redo the Common and the post office.

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Tips from Ross PD: Trending This Month: Auto Theft and Traffic Enforcement

Trending This Month:

Auto Theft

Our town has experienced an upward trend in stolen vehicles lately. In all cases, the cars were unlocked, parked on the street, with the keys left inside. These types of thefts are usually crimes of opportunity, they don't necessarily mean the town is being targeted by car thieves. More than likely, people passing through town are looking for an opportunity to steal, or perhaps find a ride out of the area. They will check doors as they walk along. If they find a car unlocked with the keys inside, they are likely to take the car as a ride home. Here are things you can do to prevent auto theft:

- Park in a well-lit area, if you can
- Hide valuables (best to take them with you)
- Lock your doors.
- Activate your alarm.
- Don't hide your key in the car, the thief will find it.

Traffic Enforcement

Traffic is a problem in many communities in Marin. Each year as school begins in our town, traffic becomes more significant. Residents have called in and helped us identify areas of concern. We respond by rotating traffic enforcement with the officer on duty. This year, an officer was scheduled to work beyond their shift for the first weeks of school to provide extra traffic enforcement in the morning. We can't be everywhere, but we can, and do rotate through the following areas:

- Sir Francis Drake near Winship
- Sir Francis Drake at Bolinas Rd.
- Bolinas Rd. at Shady Lane
- Laurel Grove at Canyon
- Lagunitas at Shady Lane and Allen Avenue.

You can help by remembering:

- Not to turn left from Bolinas Road to Shady Lane M-F from 7AM to 9AM.
- Not to make U-Turns on Ross Common near the Post Office.
- To share the road with bicyclists and scooters. If you are the parent of a bike or scooter rider, please remind them to wear their helmets and obey traffic laws, such as stopping for stop signs.

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It was not until the mid-80's that the Town had overnight police service. And we went from a volunteer fire department to a staffed department of professionals in the span of one generation of councilmembers. The corresponding expense of that is obviously a very significant change to the Town budget and taxes.

One of the biggest changes to the Town was the creation of Ross Recreation in the early 1970's. A large group of residents/parents wrote to the council asking for after care programs. The council was reluctant to expand the services to include recreation, but parents persisted, and the recreation committee was formed.

It was not until the mid-80's that the Town had a tree ordinance prohibiting the removal of trees which came after the Lagunitas Club removed 39 Redwoods. The public outcry was covered in the local press and the Council was able to pass a regulation prohibiting tree removal. My father was one of the councilmembers who drafted the original design review guidelines, which he based on his experience with ordinances working as an attorney in the County.

As many of you know, Ross does not have a planning commission and the council then and now serves that dual function which is unique from other jurisdictions. In 2005-06 there could be as many as 5 agenda items on flooding. One closed session item noted there were 34 government claims (i.e., for damages) filed regarding the flooding incident of 12/31/05 and 1/6/06. Speaking of flooding, for those of you who were here for the flooding in the 1980's you will recall as I do that Town residents went house to house on Shady Lane cleaning up mud in homes and after a few months most residents were out on the Common laying down the new grass to replace the fields that were ruined.

Today's legal requirements for legislation in a small town are incredible and much of the council's time is spent passing regulations to comply with state law. In years past, Councilmembers ignored various state regulations with which they did not want to comply. That practice is gone.

I don't want you to have the impression that the Council does not roll up their sleeves and work. An example of that is Elizabeth Robbins' volunteer efforts to save and purchase Mt. Baldy. Every one of the present councilmembers is volunteering a tremendous amount of time and contributing in different ways.

I hope you enjoyed the history lesson and as always, feel free to let me know if you have questions or concerns about the Town.

PUMA (MOUNTAIN LION) OR BOBCAT?



While there is evidence of only two pumas visiting Marin County (specifically in West Marin), it is important to know how to identify them and the more

common bobcat, and know what to do if you get close to one.

Pumas have fairly long tails in comparison to their bodies whereas the maximum tail length for a bobcat is ~6 inches. The long and short of it is, pumas very rarely attack humans, but best practice is not to approach them, keep children and pets near you, and stand your ground (i.e. do not run away). It's always a good idea to keep pets on leash and be aware of your surroundings.

Mountain lions are most active at dawn and dusk so that is when you should be the most vigilant. If you should see one, it is most likely just moving through the area.

State of the Town of Ross

More than 60 people attended the State of the Town of Ross, a presentation by Mayor Elizabeth Brekhus and Town Manager Christa Johnson held at the Livermore Pavillon in the Marin Art and Garden Center. The presentation was followed by a luncheon.

Mayor Brekhus related her experiences as a Council Member and how the duties of Council Members have evolved over the years. She developed an historical perspective from several previous Council Members, including her father, Peter Brekhus, as well as former Council Members Charlie Goodman and Gary

Ross Creek Walk & Cleanup Day—Thank you to all the volunteers!



On Saturday, September 9th Ross Dept of Public Works conducted its annual Community Creek Clean-Up to ensure Ross creeks are prepared for the upcoming winter. FEMA recognizes this annual maintenance activity as an effective means of reducing the potential for flood damage to our community.

All of our storm drain inlets and culverts drain directly into the creeks. Picking up the trash in the creeks not only help provide healthy habitats for countless animals but also prevents more pollution from entering the San Francisco Bay. Trees are vital in a riparian zone since they help cool the water and also prevent bank erosion, but they drop a lot of branches throughout the year. Large branches in the creek could potentially cause obstructions and localized flooding.

25 volunteers met at the Post Office eager to help beautify and safeguard Ross' creeks. One group of volunteers dropped down into Ross creek near the Glenwood bridge. The second group dropped into Kittle creek from Laurel Grove near MAGC. Between the two groups three yards of tree branches and 4 fifty-five gallons bags of trash were pulled out and disposed of.


